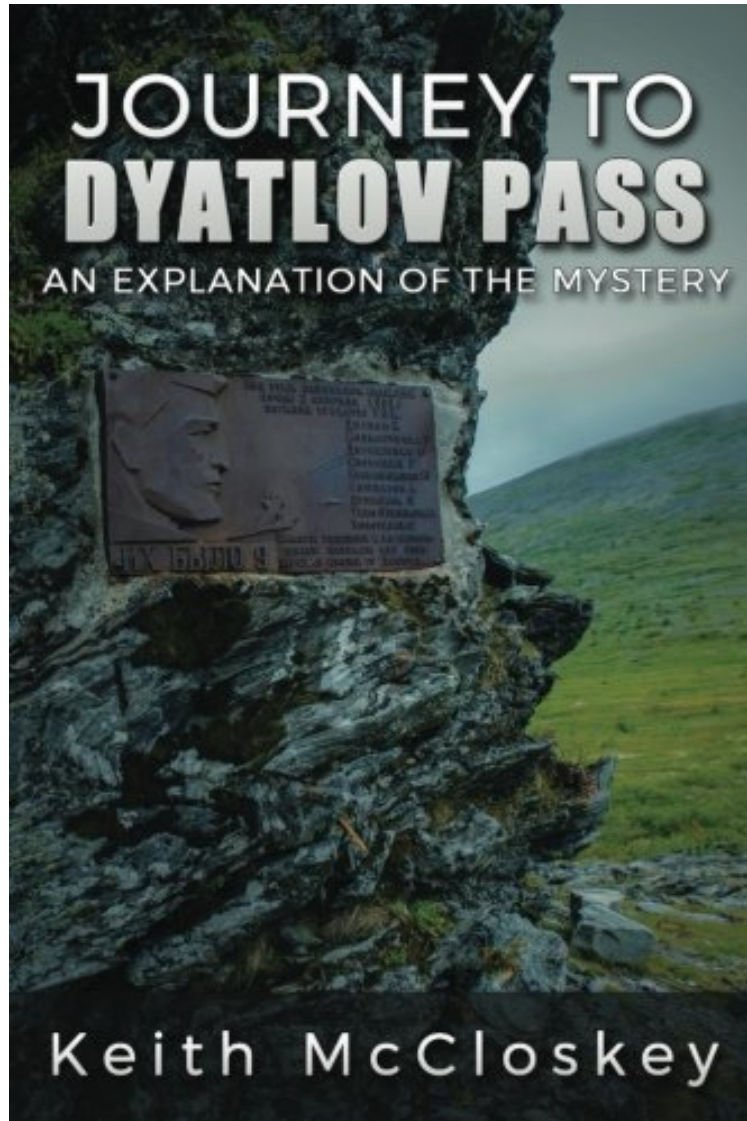

In my opinion, the author does an excellent job of bringing this perplexing tragedy to the English-speaking audience. In his first book, he

presented the majority of the popular theories to the incident at the time and now follows that up with his 2nd book. His 2nd book also provides the reader with a personal, ride-along as the author travels to the scene of the incident and gives us a glimpse of Russia and how difficult it is to get to the site 55-years later. While this tragedy took place over half a century ago, he is mindful that family members and friends of the victims are alive and they deserve respect. I enjoy the author's casual and informative writing style. I've also read the author's book, *The Lighthouse The Mystery of the Eilean Mor Lighthouse Keepers* *The Lighthouse: The Mystery of the Eilean Mor Lighthouse Keepers* again, he does a great job with his research and treatment of the story. The author is respectful of everyone's theories of these incidents and doesn't make judgements. He presents each theory and material and lets the reader choose. After finishing *Journey to Dyatlov Pass*, I decided to order another of his books which should arrive soon. While this book was written for those familiar with the incident, a few minutes of online reading will quickly bring you up to speed. By KFMT This was my second book on this subject, the first being *Dead Mountain*. I haven't read Mr. McCloskey's first book about Dyatlov Pass and in fact I didn't even know there was a first book until after I'd bought this one. I found this book to be entertaining and a very enjoyable read. To get some perspective on the area that the event occurred in, what the terrain is like, what it's like to actually be there and walk the ground, you won't go wrong there. One problem I had with the book as it pertains to the subject matter was also one of the reasons I enjoyed reading it; a good portion of the book is more of a travelogue about the authors trip to the area, the people he met, and the experience he had. And while I did find that interesting, it didn't do much to further my quest for knowledge about the incident itself. I thought the author could have spent more time examining the subject at hand and less time describing his travels and travails during his trip. I found the author's theories about what occurred to be interesting but I'm not sure they're all that plausible. I did think they were more plausible than those presented in *Dead Mountain* however. All in all this is a pretty good book. Mr. McCloskey writes like he's telling you a story around a campfire or a kitchen table which is enjoyable and by the end of the book makes you feel like you almost know him. That's not a terrible thing, and his description of the pass itself and what it's like to be there helps the reader put together a mental image of the area that everyone is talking about. That's not a bad thing either. This is a pleasantly written and fun to read book. If you're interested in the story this isn't the worst book you could buy. It also takes for granted that the reader is already familiar with the Dyatlov Pass story however, so keep that in mind if your thinking about reading it.

This book describes the author's journey to the Dyatlov Pass in the northern Ural Mountains in the company of Russian Dyatlov "Obsessives". It is also a book for people who already know the Dyatlov story. The physical locations relating to the Dyatlov Incident are examined and discussed as well as competing theories from some of the group members about what happened. The second part of the book takes a critical look at the autopsies. This is followed by an intensive look at some ground-breaking research on the Dyatlov negatives by Valentin Gerasimovich Yakimenko. The final part of the book discusses the statements made by the two senior figures in the investigation and finishes with a scenario as to what may have happened on that fateful night of 1/2 February 1959.

I have a particular interest in the Dyatlov Incident and have extensively researched the subject and also travelled to the Dyatlov Pass.
