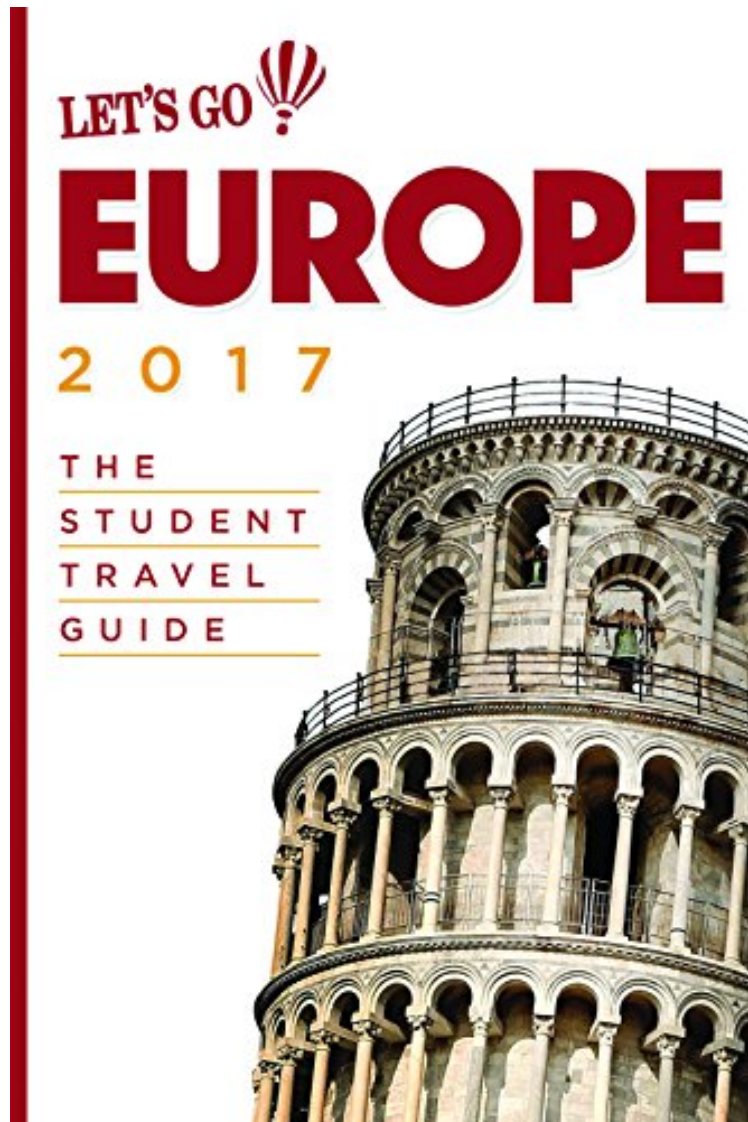

It inexplicably leaves out countries (most notably Switzerland since the book is geared towards western Europe) and seems more concerned with coming across as witty than actually providing useful information. The book is also a bit sloppy. There is a paragraph discussing Istanbul accidentally included in the Budapest chapter despite the fact that Turkey isn't even

included in the book. It focuses heavily on hostels and night life neither of which I was particularly interested in. It is much easier to just look up hostels online to see up to date reviews of them and current availability and pricing. It's not that it has every fun thing you can do, but the descriptions and reviews are almost always exactly right or underselling it. It has a wide range of recommendations so you can usually find something that looks interesting and always somewhere to stay.
