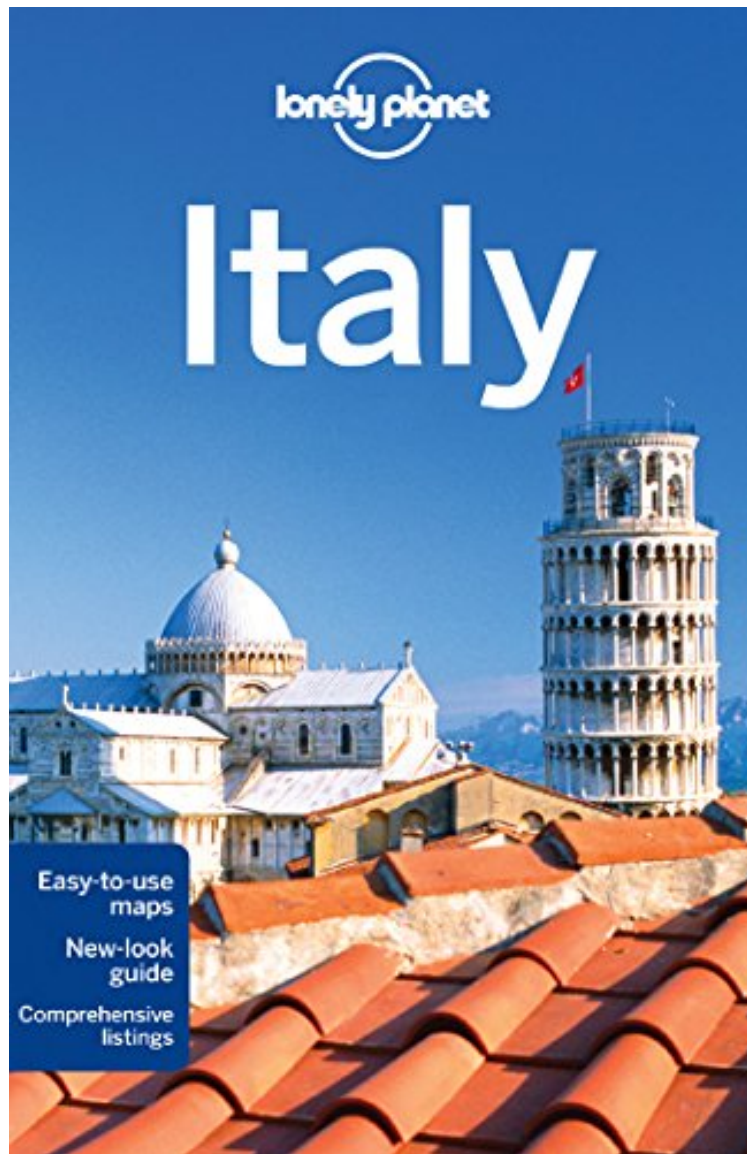

The book is up to date and well written. However, one of the recommendations for a bed and breakfast in Venice was not on the mark. Also, a restaurant in Milan was not as good as advertised. Not only does it cover every region of Italy (not many books do), but it had all the essential sights and activities covered - walking tours, boat rides, hiking ideas (again, something not many books have), scenic drives, and little villages we might not have otherwise known about. You also get detailed coverage of parts of the country seldom even mentioned in most other travel guides, like Calabria (the toe of the boot) and Abruzzo (even though it's beautiful and relatively close to Rome). It wisely places a lot of emphasis on food and drink - not only going into detail about regional cuisines, but even down to the specialty of nearly every little town. I don't think I've ever eaten so well... the restaurant suggestions were terrific (you definitely want to grab some Fatamorgana gelato in Rome)! The included fold-out map of Rome was handy, but you'll probably want to invest in an even more detailed stand-alone one, as we did. If you're spending more than a week in a given region, like in Tuscany or around Venice, you may want a more in-depth book. But for us, there was more than enough information for a grand time in Italy.
