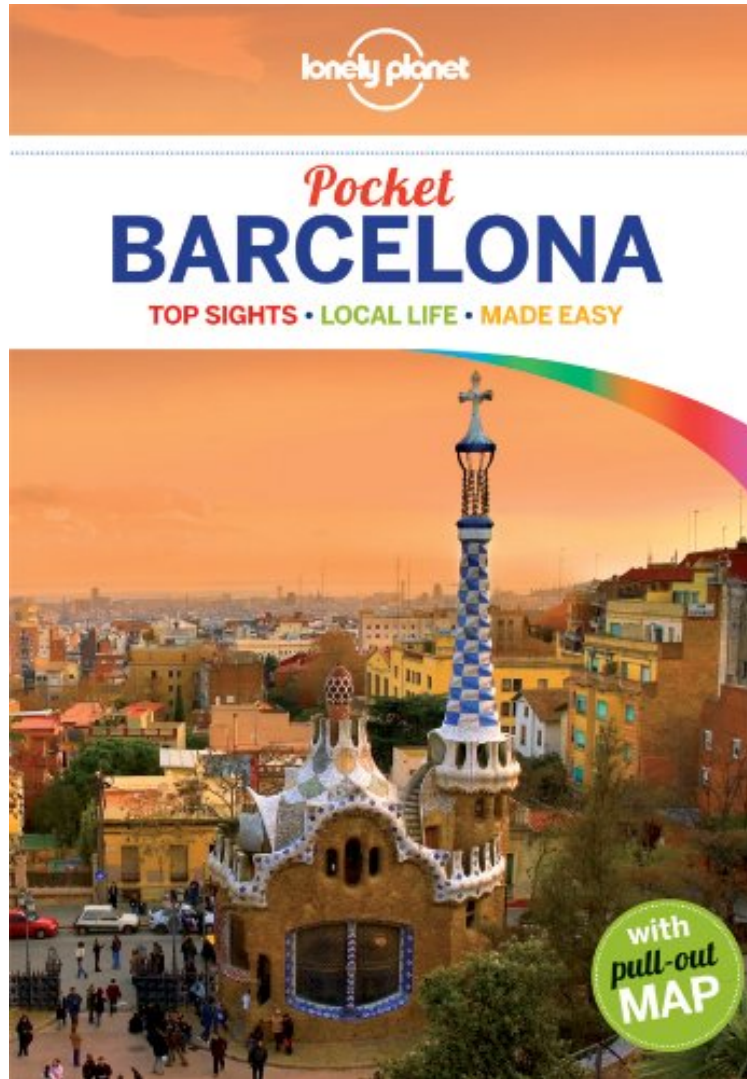

Miss the Encounters series By Wesley Beltz I haven't been to Barcelona yet so I can't judge the accuracy, but already I'm not a fan of this compared to last year's Encounters series. The layout is somehow more confusing and disorganized and the various neighborhoods don't seem as well defined. Also I just noticed that it continues to use the price tier rating for dining used in the Encounters series. The problem is that the Pocket Barcelona guide fails to assign a monetary value to low, mid, and high range dining. This can vary wildly between cities. Last year's Berlin Encounters guide rated a low range meal at under 10 euro, while the same guide for Amsterdam rated low range as under 20 euro. This feels like a pretty big oversight in my opinion.
