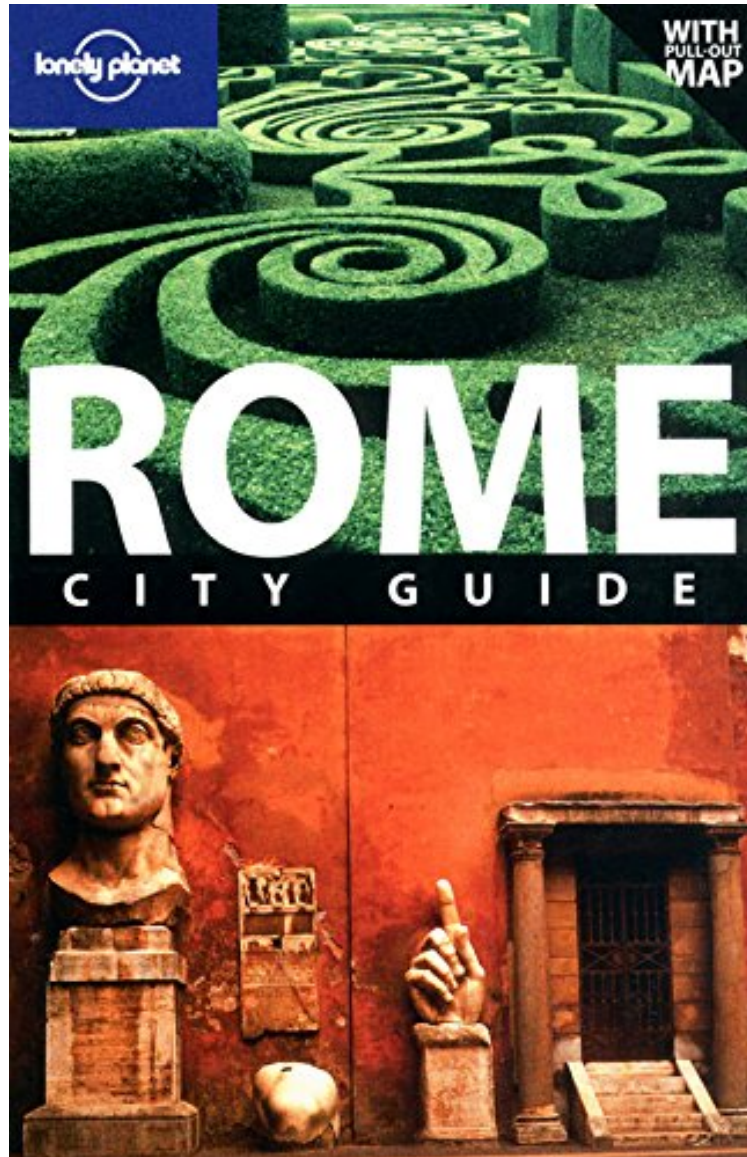

It was so bad that I decided to stop reading it and buy the Rick Steves Rome book instead. Aside from it looking not that great, the hyperlinks mostly don't work properly. They take you near where they're supposed to, but not exactly there. Also, the maps aren't very good. That's forgivable for a Kindle

version of a travel book, but Rick Steves usually has decent maps, even in digital form. The organization was a mess. It didn't seem to make a lot of sense or flow very well. The information on the sights were pretty basic. Sometimes, it did have some interesting additional information, and the history section was cool, but the book was so odd to navigate that I couldn't really take advantage of the few nuggets of solid information it had. It also didn't make it easy at all to find the sights it was talking about.
