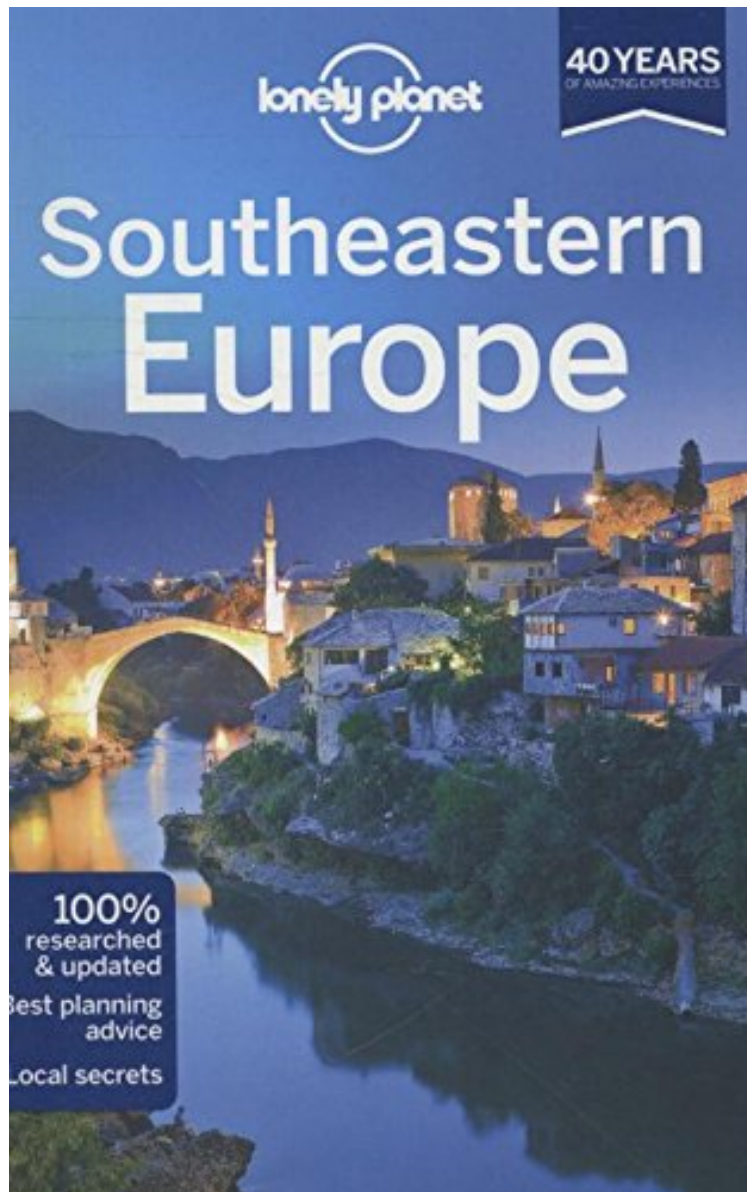

This book is a good start to thinking about where you want to travel in the region if you have an extended period of time. However, I found that I then still had to do a lot of searching online to find additional places to go - within cities already listed as well as cities that were missed in the guide. I understand that it is difficult to put so many countries in a book that is still bearable to own and carry, but they miss a lot of every city that I loved. I would not suggest purchasing it unless you just want the maps. Even the maps won't help you in most places because street signs are rarely visible, and you need to be able to count the exact number of streets in order to find the right place (rather than their use of just main streets). However, if you do enjoy food, it is a great guide as to where you should eat. I did not dislike a single restaurant suggested by the book. Save your money, and do your internet research. If you are only going to one or two countries, buy the specific country books. I also agree with another poster that The Rough Guide tends to be better for experienced travelers, but I couldn't find one that covered all the countries, so I caved when buying this.
